MEDIA STUDIES

KS5 Media – BFI Revision Day 06.12.24 Written by Erin H (Yr13)

With the BFI's analytical and publicity position, A-Level Media students were able to effectively understand the impact of political ideologies, contextual knowledge and relevant theoretical studies on large corporate newspapers. The day was defined as 'impeccably helpful' and 'extremely informative' as we gained further insight into the newspaper/journalism industry and the power of media representation, covering newspapers outside the curriculum and gaining attentive awareness of potential future exam questions through collective analysis. The interactivity of the event and welcoming atmosphere allowed students to openly explain their interpretations of certain aspects of newspaper articles and images, linking to contextual factors and theoretical implications in the process. Substantially, the active Q&A experience with Guardian columnist and senior editor of diversity and development, Joseph Harker, allowed students to comprehend aspects of newspaper journalism that are underrepresented or isolated from general publication. Overall, the inspiring experience proved significantly beneficial with exam practice and newspaper analysis, making the BFI lecture a 'must-do' event for any aspirational media students.





Year 10 Media – BBFC Virtual Talk – November 2024

Year 10 Media Studies students had the excellent opportunity of a virtual talk with the BBFC (UK Film Regulators) back in November. Students thoroughly enjoyed learning about the history of the BBFC and why one of their set texts, No Time to Die, received the age rating it did. Students commented on the "great interactivity" of the session, as well as the "depth of examples" that were used to help with their understanding of film regulation.

Students were absolutely brilliant and are now experts of regulation in the film industry!



School Related Anxiety (after the holidays)

The beginning of a new term, half-term or even a regular Monday morning can be particularly challenging for those struggling with EBSA.

- 1. Do the walk-throughs and talk-throughs which help to prepare a young person for an upcoming stressful situation. For example, you might talk to them about who is going to be teaching them, look at their new timetable, make sure they know where to put their things, who to go to if they are feeling anxious.
- 2. Try to create a daily routine. Getting organised the night before gives the message that we expect to be in school. Getting up, dressed, breakfasted, out of the door, arriving at school, and knowing exactly what to do once on site, and then doing it all in the same order, at the same time, creates habits which, over time, reduce anxiety.
- 3. Wherever possible give your child or young person a sense of power and control for example you could ask them what they need to help them get into school, or how they would like to be treated if they are late. Working with them to come up with a plan helps them feel more in control which allays anxiety and builds confidence.
- 4. Does your child have strategies to calm themselves when they are starting to feel overwhelmed, and are these strategies practiced regularly? For example, you could teach them the rectangle technique: o Put both feet on the floor o Spend 20 seconds counting how many rectangles you can see around you o Choose one of the rectangles and start to breathe around it always breathing in on the short sides and out on the long sides. o Keep tracking around the rectangle for as long as you need to.

Working together to keep our young people safe Secondary | December 2024

Instagram Teen Accounts

Earlier this year, Instagram introduced a new feature designed specifically for teenagers: the Teen Account. This new account type aims to create a safer, more controlled environment for teens on Instagram, offering parents greater peace of mind about their children's safety while using the platform.

The Teen Account comes with additional privacy protections and safeguards tailored for younger users. These features include limitations on who can interact with teens and enhanced controls over the content that teens can access.

Parents will also have access to specific tools that help them oversee their child's Instagram experience, allowing them to guide and support safe and healthy social media use.

Currently, the Teen Account is available to some users in the United States and the United Kingdom. Instagram plans to expand this feature globally, making it available to all eligible users by early 2025.

How will Teen Accounts work?

Private accounts: Teen Accounts are automatically set to private, meaning only approved followers can see and interact with your teen's posts. Follow requests must be accepted by your teen, ensuring they have control over their connections.

Message restrictions: Only those who follow the teen can message them.

Sensitive content restrictions: Teen Accounts are automatically set to the highest level of protection against sensitive content. This means your teen will have the most restricted view, helping to ensure they only see age-appropriate content while using Instagram.

Limited interactions: Teens can only be tagged or mentioned in posts originating from those who they follow.

Time limits: Users are sent notifications after 60 minutes of use each day.


Sleep mode: Sleep mode is turned on between 10pm-7am which mutes notifications and sends auto-replies to direct messages.

The supervision feature gives parents more insight and control over their child's account. With this tool, parents can:

- view who their child is chatting with
- set daily time limits
- block Instagram access
- see the topics their child is exploring.

Teen Accounts provide an added layer of protection to help safeguard children online but they are not a guarantee against all online risks. They work best when combined with the active involvement and monitoring of parents. Think of them as a helpful tool to support, not replace, your role in keeping your child safe online.





SPOTLIGHT ON SAFEGUARDING

Gaming streaming sites

Gaming streaming sites are online platforms that enable users to watch others play video games in real time or view recorded gameplay sessions. Much like tuning into a sports channel to catch a football match, these sites offer the chance to witness games unfold live. This experience can be both entertaining and informative for computer game enthusiasts, as well as for those seeking to gain insights into a game before diving in themselves. It is thought that over 83% of 12-15 year olds play online games, many of them through gaming streaming sites.

Gaming streaming sites are also used to:

Watch others play: Viewers can watch players play popular video games in real-time for entertainment purposes.

Live interaction: Viewers can chat with the streamer (the person playing the game) and other viewers.

Learn new games and techniques: Many viewers watch streams to learn tips and strategies.

Some popular gaming streaming sites are:

Twitch: One of the most popular platforms for watching live video game streams. Streamers play games and interact with their viewers. Twitch has channels (separate groups) for nearly every type of game and is popular among younger audiences.

YouTube Gaming: A part of YouTube dedicated to gaming content, where viewers can watch live streams or recorded videos. It's similar to Twitch but integrated into the YouTube platform.

Discord: Though not a dedicated streaming site, Discord allows communities to stream games privately, often as a social activity among friends.

RISKS ASSOCIATED WITH GAMING STREAMING SITES

Inappropriate content:

- bad language
- themes of violence, aggression, or crude humour
- adult discussions and images
- references to drugs and alcohol.

Unmonitored interactions and cyberbullying:

- chat features allow viewers to interact with streamers and users, risking exposure to inappropriate messages
 - the prevalence of negative comments and trolling during streams.

Potential for grooming:

- predators use platforms to connect with and manipulate children
- some users may pose as friendly, asking personal questions that can lead to children inadvertently sharing private information.

Unwanted School Uniform – Donations Needed



12 Smartphone Online Safety Tips

FOR CHILDREN WITH NEW DEVICES



ALWAYS SECURE YOUR PHONE WITH A PASSWORD

This will help to keep your private information safe and won't allow others to access your phone without your permission. Make sure your password is memorable and personal to you but something which other people can't guess, and always share it with your parents just in case you forget it.

DISABLE LOCATION SETTINGS

This can usually be done from the device's privacy control settings. Disabling location settings means that your phone can't be tracked by others an strangers can't tell where you are when you're using it. It also helps to save

ALWAYS USE A SECURE WIFI NETWORK

When you use your WIFI at home usually it is a secure network that or you and your family know the password to. Public networks, like those in coffee shops, can be accessed by anyone which means that people could potentially hack into your device and access your personal information without you realising.

ONLY PAIR WITH BLUETOOTH DEVICES YOU KNOW

A Bluetooth connection with another device means that you can send and receive data wirelessly. For example, you could listen to music wirelessly or receive pictures and videos from your friends. However, pairing your phone with a device you don't know means that you could be sharing personal information with a stranger or could leave your device open to receiving viruses.

ONLY USE APPS WHICH YOU ARE OLD ENOUGH TO USE

Before downloading any new apps, always check the age-rating of the app. If you need help, ask your parent or carer to make sure that the app is safe for you to use and never download anything which you are too young for as it may contain things that aren't safe for you to see.

BEWARE OF BECOMING AddICTED TO YOUR PHONE

Your phone can be fun to use and it's easy to become too attached, whether it's keeping in touch with friends, discovering new features or downloading the latest apps. Remember its always good to talk in person, go out and have fun. and get regular exercise. This will keep you fit and healthy and make you appreciate there's more to life than just your mobile phone.

LIMIT YOUR SCREEN TIME

Using your phone for too long, particularly in the evenings, can make you feel tired at school, affect your concentration and make you lose interest in other things in life. Only use your phone at certain times of the day and don't use it close to bedtime. You can set a 'screen time limit' via the settings on your phone. This will help you stay fit and healthy and means that you will still be able to focus and perform well at school.

THINK OF OTHERS WHEN TAKING PHOTOS

Don't take embarrassing photos of other people on your phone. If other peop get access to the photo and share it with more people, it could make that person really upset and treated as a form of bullying. Always be mindful of the photos you take using your camera and who you share them with.

MAKE SURE YOUR PARENTS SET UP 'PARENTAL CONTROLS'

This means that you will be able to use your phone safely and securely and won't accidently do things you shouldn't do. The best time to do this is when you get a new phone or device so that you're protected from the very

ALWAYS TALK TO YOUR PARENTS IF YOU DON'T FEEL SAFE

Sometimes, even though your phone is really secure, you might see somethin you don't like, or someone might contact you who you don't know. If this happens, always tell your trusted adult like your parents, carers, other adult family members or a teacher, all of whom will be able to support you and advise you on what you should do next.

DON'T TEXT AND WALK

This might seem like a strange thing to say but it can be dangerous to stare at your mobile phone whilst walking outside alongside busy roads or bicycle itha in some cases, children have been knocked over by cars or cyclists because they haven't been aware of their surroundings whilst texting or playing games on their mobile devices.

DON'T SHARE YOUR NUMBER OR YOUR DEVICE WITH PEOPLE YOU DON'T KNOW.

Never feel pressured into sharing your phone number with people you don't know and don't lend your phone to strangers or keep it where others could get hold of it. Look affer your device and always keep it hidden from sight to avoid it being stolen of broken into

Young people are vulnerable to online exploitation, particularly when it comes to gambling and scams. Children are susceptible to targeted ads and phishing scams (which use fraudulent tactics to acquire personal information) and are, therefore, more likely to fall prey to these schemes.

It is important to be aware of anyone a child may come into contact with online. Adults may pose as children in order to groom them. They may meet other young people, that they do not know in real life, who may exploit them.

We have had notification from the police, regarding young people collapsing due to the use illegal vapes

Parents of teenagers – be aware of the dangers of vaping

Recently, several children have fainted/collapsed after using illegally bought vapes.

In one case the vape was sent off for testing by Public Health and found to contain Methyl 3, 3-dimethyl-2-1(1-(pent-4-en-1-yl)-1H-indazole-3-carboxamido) butanoate (MDMB-4en-PINACA).

The results show the vape does not contain THC but contained a synthetic cannabinoid, which are used as Spice and Mamba.

The vape that was tested was refillable and the liquid tested was bright yellow.

This has been reported in national newspapers and is happening Country wide.

Child Friendly Cov is a commitment that as a whole city to make Coventry the best place in the UK for children and young people to live and grow up. One of the Child Friendly Cov pledges is that all children and young people in Coventry should 'be and feel safe'. Findings from the One Big Voice Survey which was completed earlier this year with children and young people from across Coventry, identified many primary and secondary aged children and young people, do not feel safe when travelling and walking around the city. As a result, Coventry City Council and West Midlands Police collaborated to create the 'Safe Spaces' initiative.

Safe Spaces are places, spaces, and venues across the city where young people can go if they feel they need support, if their phone needs to be charged, or if their parent/ carer needs to be contacted. All Safe Spaces have completed training and received a Safe Spaces pack, which includes a window sticker to ensure the Safe Space is identifiable.

To raise awareness about Safe Spaces the two videos have been developed, one aimed at young people, and one aimed at parents, carers and professionals. Please help to get the word out about Safe Spaces by sharing these videos far and wide, with the young people you work with, their parents/ carers, with any of your own family or friends who live in Coventry, and with other professionals.
